One rainy day, Bruce lay on the ground under a rude shed, listening to the patter of the drops on the roof above him. He was tired and sick at heart, and ready to give up all hope. It seemed to him that there was no use for him to try to do anything more.

As he lay thinking, he saw a spider over his head, making ready to weave her web. He watched her as she toiled slowly and with great care. Six times she tried to throw her frail thread from one beam to another, and six times it fell short.

"Poor thing!" said Bruce: "you, too, know what it is to fail."

But the spider did not lose hope with the sixth failure. With still more care, she made ready to try for the seventh time. Bruce almost forgot his own troubles as he watched her swing herself out upon the slender line. Would she fail again? No! The thread was carried safely to the beam, and fastened there.

"I, too, will try a seventh time!" cried Bruce.

He arose and called his men together. He told them of his plans, and sent them out with messages of cheer to his disheartened people. Soon there was an army of brave Scotchmen around him. Another battle was fought, and the King of England was glad to go back into his own country. [End]

[Epilogue] I have heard it said, that, after that day, no one by the name of Bruce would ever hurt a spider. The lesson which the little creature had taught the king was never forgotten.

Narrative Elements

- Setting Scotland, early fourteenth century. (Battle of Bannockburn was June 24, 1314.)
- Characters Robert the Bruce and a spider
- **Conflict** Bruce is discouraged because his army is defeated and scattered. A spider is spinning her web, attempting to attach thread to a beam just out of reach.
- **Resolution** Spider is successful on her seventh attempt; Bruce is encouraged to try again by her determination.

Investigate the Context

- ◆ Identify the poem's **Literary Genre**
 - **Genre by literary period** early 20th century American retelling of a story from fourteenth century Scotland

• Genre by poetic/narrative category – Treat as nonfiction, with possible fictional details: Robert Bruce is
considered a national hero in Scotland, as is George
Washington in the United States. This story is a part of
the "mythology" of the Scottish nation, very much like the
American story of George Washington and his hatchet. The
word "mythology " does not imply that any of these stories
are necessarily false. By "mythology," we are referring to
the accepted narrative of a particular nation which helps to
shape and express its values. This is related to Tolkien's idea
that myth is often the best way to convey truth that would
not otherwise be expressed. (*The Inklings*, by Humphrey
Carpenter, relates a conversation about this between Tolkien
and his then-athiest friend, C.S. Lewis.)



Answers will vary: 5. He was at war with Robert Bruce, and had led them into Scotland. 6. Bruce watched the spider as she toiled. Six times she tried to throw it.

NARRATIVE PLOT ANALYSIS

This is only a guide to how a student might apply Theon's Six to a narrative. There are no "right" answers. Please work with your students, and allow them to give you the reasons for their answers. Only correct them if absolutely necessary (for example, if they did not do a complete job).

Person

Robert the Bruce – defeated, separated from scattered army, tired, sick at heart, ready to give up hope; Spider – careful and patient

Action

Bruce watched the spider spin her web, and make six unsuccessful attempts to attach it to a beam. She was successful on the seventh try, which gave him hope to try again with his own army.

Place

mountains of Scotland, under a rude shed

Time

after sixth defeat of his army by the King of England.

Manner

Bruce – watched in discouragement at first, in hope at the end; Spider – weaved slowly and with great care


Cause

Bruce – watching because of the rain and his dejection; Spider – because of instinct


